It is renowned for its beautifully landscaped rolling hills and gardens, historic monuments and sculptures and the many notable people who are buried there. It is often referred to as a “hidden gem” in Lowell.



Located on a beautifully landscaped hill with expansive views of historic Lowell Cemetery, the architecturally distinctive project blends into the existing landscape of the cemetery and its significant heritage.

The unique design features three curved walls with niches for urns containing cremated remains, a pavilion under which people can gather, natural walkways and plantings and benches for contemplation.

The project was named for Oliver M. Whipple, an industrialist who donated the land on which the cemetery is located. Whipple served as President of the cemetery from 1841 - 1857.
